COM List Projects—Streator Baptist Camp

Build new camp sign in front of the manager's house
Install window in camp kitchen
Build 10'X10' sunshade frame at Ax Throwing
Build 10'x10' Sunshade frame by Archery
Install trim in camp Kitchen
Install trim in snack shack
Set up washer and dryer in Lodge Basement
Build a new bell tower
Build wood 9 square game in rec field
Pour concrete and move flagpole
Install hanging lights around large campfire spot
Replace lights on the front of prairie center.
Check and fixed a damaged window screen
Run 30-amp camper hookup to new camper spot at manager's house.
Tighten up all the bolts in the beds in bunk house 1 and 2
Turn on water to lake pavilion and check for leaks
Paint sidewalk tripping hazards.

She was a great blessing to us at a time we needed those supplies to meet the needs we have for several Catholic hospitals in the St. Louis area who are asking for bears, a missionary in South America who is asking for more bears, a connection with a military base in the St. Louis area who is interested in getting bears, the up-coming Fall Festival at the Baptist Children's home where we distributed many bears and the great need for bags for the homeless shelter at MorningStar Mission.

We were all so excited to see what God was doing by connecting us. That \$1000 gift will open up many opportunities to share the gospel with a lost and hurting world. Always be looking for the miracles that God has in store for you. We see them everyday in some way with IL COM—whether it is a gift like this, an opportunity to get the word of God into places that normally would not allow it in, a new person you meet that is blessed with an As You Go Bear, churches that get behind our sewing projects with money or materials or sewing with us, or any number of ways God steps in to make what we think is surprising or impossible part of what He has planned for a long time. Elvira Barrow, 88, of Washington, IL passed away at 1:50 pm on Sunday, May 25, 2025 at Apostolic Christian Restmor in Morton, IL. Elvira was born on September 9, 1936 in Golden Pond, KY, to Floy Dean Hicks and Elvis Hlcks.

Elvira grew up on a farm in the Land Between the Lakes in Kentucky. She graduated from Trigg County High School in Cadiz, KY in 1955. She married James Barrow, from Model, TN on April 19, 1958 also in the Land Between the Lakes. He preceded her in death in 2020. She is also preceded in death by her parents; and one older brother, Cleveland Hicks of Dearborn, MI.

She is survived by her two daughters, Rita (Kim) Byard of Morton, IL, and Julie (Stan) Zehr of Eureka, IL; her five grandchildren, Jared (Megan) Byard and Lisa (Cody) Clark of Morton, IL, Bradley (Joylynn) Zehr of Peoria, IL, Laura Zehr of Altamonte Springs, FL, and Matthew Zehr of Davenport, IA; and her 7 great grandchildren, Kaden, Addison, Riley, Avery, Rowan, Everett, and Alaina.

Elvira worked as the head baker/assistant cook at District 50 schools in Washington, IL for 22 years. She enjoyed making cookies from scratch for the kids, and would regularly bake 600 cookies per day, which was enough for both schools in the district. Elvira also enjoyed gardening, and would freeze or can vegetables and fruit from her garden. During earlier years, she enjoyed sewing and making crafts that she would sell at the annual Spoon River Drive Craft Show. She shared a booth with her husband, James, at these events.

Elvira was a 60 year member of Dayton Avenue Baptist Church in Peoria, IL, where she enjoyed singing in the choir. She, along with her husband and daughters, was a member of the "God's Little Messengers" puppet team. They, along with other members of the team, took 4 summer trips, traveling across the country, sharing the good news of Jesus Christ. Elvira and James were also members of the Illinois Campers on Mission. They would go on mission trips to build and remodel church buildings, or participate in yard clean up at summer camp facilities.

Elvira was an avid fan of the Chicago Cubs. During baseball season, you would usually find her in front of, or talking back to, the TV whenever a player struck out or when the other team scored. During the last few family gatherings, she would just sit quietly and watch all of the great grandchildren playing together.
